Director's Corner

As many of you are no doubt aware, the State of Mississippi experienced significant revenue shortfalls in the 2017 fiscal year; what may surprise you is that state tax revenue helps fund the services of public libraries in Mississippi.

The Bolivar County Library System has experienced an annual loss of \$32,538 (-49.5%) in funding from the State of Mississippi from the prior ten year average of \$65,696. We have had to make tough budget decisions to achieve a balanced operating budget, and we take our stewardship of your tax dollars very seriously. We have tried to make the smartest, most service-oriented decisions that we could. Unfortunately that includes the elimination of non-essential items such as plastic book bags, and some digital services including Rocket Languages, Ancestry Library, HeritageQuest Online (including Home Access), and Freegal Music Service.

Although the current funding situation from the State is difficult, we still have

a lot to be grateful for at the Bolivar County Library System. We're committed to maintaining our budget for print and e-books, Internet access, and operating hours. Four of our libraries now have high-speed, fiber optic Internet access. The libraries in Cleveland, Rosedale, and Shelby all have Wi-Fi available outside on library premises even when the libraries aren't open. We've begun offering Storyhour on the first Saturday of every month, and we will continue to provide programming throughout the year for Senior Citizens and children.

We also have a wonderful Endowment Foundation and Friends of the Library group. This year the Friends of the Library are funding access to WorldBook Online, supporting e-book purchasing, and assisting with the Summer Library Program. The Endowment Foundation is supporting the purchase of new display furniture that will enhance our staff's ability to promote reading activities for young and old alike.

Finally, we are so thankful for strong local support from our County Board of Supervisors and the municipalities of Cleveland, Shelby, Rosedale, Boyle, and Merigold. Their funding appropriations to BCLS have ensured that we haven't had to cut operating hours or book budgets. Thank you.

Before the next legislative session starts in January, please let your State legislators know how important the library is to you, and how important State funding is to the library. Also, please remember to thank the County Board of Supervisors and your local city aldermen and mayors in Cleveland, Shelby, Rosedale, Boyle, and Merigold and for their ongoing support.

If you have any questions about our operating budget, or our decision making process, please don't hesitate to contact me. I am always happy to hear from our users and community members. Your input is essential to our decision making process.

Evelyn Brown joined the Bolivar County Library System (BCLS) in November 2013, working as the Branch Librarian at Mound Bayou and, later that year, for the Thelma Rayner Memorial Library in Merigold, as well. Evelyn now works four days a week at Merigold and one day per week at the Robinson-Carpenter Memorial Library in Cleveland.



Evelyn states that she first gained library experience while attending Delta State University (DSU) in 1980 working at the then W. B. Roberts Library in Cleveland. As part of the work study program, Evelyn completed various office and circulation desk tasks, including maintaining the card catalog, shelving books, and assisting patrons in the use of microfiche and microfilm. "I enjoyed working at the library," Evelyn confides, "helping patrons find the material they need." Since joining BCLS, she has attended the Technology Academy at the Mississippi Library Commission in Jackson. "I like attending workshops," Evelyn states, "just to keep up on what is being taught and new technologies. I also spend a lot of time looking at new things and playing around with them. I like doing research. I like the spirit of collaboration and the fact that everyone seems to like their job here. It's amazing and really uplifting to be around people who like coming to work and being able to see specific ways where your input has helped someone else in some way.

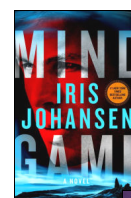
Looking For a Good Book?

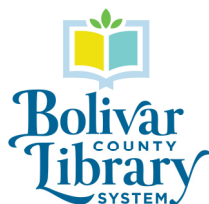

Some Bolivar County History...

“Bolivar County Troops in the Civil War (Continued)

By Captain W. R. Shepherd

Commissioned and Non-Commissioned Officers of the McGehee Rifles at the Time of Organization

“I wish to relate an incident in regard to our Captain Canty. Harry Canty was one of God’s noblemen—a man of wealth, education, and refinement, brave as a lion, yet as gentle as a woman—a strict disciplinarian when on duty, but plain “Harry Canty” when off duty. After being in the service a few months, he obtained a leave of absence and came home to marry Miss Webb, a niece of Major Torry of Perthshire, Mississippi. He took his bride to his relatives in South Carolina and returned to his company.

When General Grant crossed the Mississippi River at Port Gibson, there was but one regiment of cavalry in this department. Horses were impressed, and the 20th Mississippi and the 8th Kentucky Infantry regiments were mounted and sent out in Grant’s front. In a few days, the company was ordered to protect the bridge across Turkey Creek. Captain Canty was the only commissioned officer with the company that day. In marching down the road to the bridge, Captain Canty requested me, if anything happened to him, to try to get all his valuables off his body. I told him I would try to comply with his request. We were forced to retire, with a loss of one man killed and two wounded.

On the day of the battle of Champion Hill, after dismounting and marching up the road to take position, Captain Canty repeated his request, and he especially wanted me to get his wife’s picture in a locket he wore around his neck. I asked him if he had a presentiment that he was going to get hurt. He replied that you never can tell what will happen in a battle. He was shot in the forehead and killed instantly. Lieutenant Williams and I got everything except his money. The Yanks were coming over the hill three battles lines deep, and we had to get away or be captured. I removed one of his wife’s letters from the envelope and laid the envelope on his breast. The Federals buried him beside the road and marked his grave with his name, rank, and regiment.

After the war Mrs. Canty had his body removed to South Carolina, where he rests among his own people.

The McGehee Rifles left Bolivar County of the 1st of July, 1861, with 96 men. All have answered the last roll call except the writer.*

*Captain Shepherd’s death occurred soon after he had written this article. With his death passed the last member of the McGehee Rifles.”
