## **Director's Corner**

Recently, we upgraded our Wi-Fi system! Wi-Fi is available at the Cleveland, Rosedale and Shelby branches. The new system is a more reliable mesh system which allows patrons to move freely throughout the library and stay connected to our network. Previously, patrons had to connect to each individual access point and could not roam about without losing access. Additionally, we added an access point in the Teen Room at Robinson-Carpenter Memorial Library at the recommendation of our TAG (Teen Advisory Group).

The new system will allow us to assess our network to identify potential problems, such as downed access points or other communication failures. It will also show how much our Wi-Fi network is used at each branch. Previously, we estimated the usage. I look forward to the data this upgrade will provide so that we can see how to better serve our patrons.

### The Talisman Theater

The "Talisman" was the first movie theater in Rosedale. It was opened by W.

M. Priestly in 1910 and bought out by John V. Lobdell in 1916., who named it the "Talisman" after Sir Walter Scott's famous novel. Lobdell's daughter Lillian operated theater until her sister Anne became the manager in 1922. Anne enlarged the theater, both Volume XVI, Issue 4

improving and modernizing it. Sound equipment was added in 1930 for a cost of \$10,000. Upon her father's death in 1933, Anne became the owner. Upon Anne's death in 1940, Ethel Lobdell eventually bought out the owners and moved the "Talisman" to a newer, more modern building. Upon her death in 1958, the property of the Lobdells went to Mrs. Coralie Coppedge Staples, who sold the "Talisman" in 1975, at which time it was closed.

## Looking for a Good Book?

Anna: Dress Your Family in Corduroy and Denim by David Sedaris. This book is a collection of nonfiction essays. Sedaris' droll, astute commentary on the strange and the mundane is always a joy to read. Much of his writing centers around family, his childhood, aging, and the gay experience. Easy to read, funny, gratifying. (Non-Fiction—Print)

Anna: The Fifth Season: The Broken Earth Book One by N.K. Jemisin. When our enigmatic protagonist, Essun, loses her son in a vile act of hatred at the hand of her husband, she vows to avenge his death and find her kidnapped daughter. However, matters are complicated by her closeted orogeny (the ability to connect to and manipulate the Earth). Oh, and the world is ending. This is a great sci-fi fantasy read with captivating world building. (Fiction—Print)

Martha: Reckless Girls by Rachel Hawkins. Lux and her boyfriend Nico are paid by two women to sail them to a Meroe Island, a remote island in the South Pacific. The island is supposed to be deserted, but it is rumored that strange things have happened there! Looking forward to being off the grid, they are surprised to arrive and find a boat already anchored there. The other couple on the boat are very welcoming, but then strange things start to happen! The women's backstory is told in alternating voices. This is not a romance but rather a suspense novel that will keep you on the edge of your seat. I thoroughly enjoyed this page turner! I look forward to reading more of Ms. Hawkins books. (Fiction—Large Print)

Tamara: Lady of Bones (A Sarah Booth Delaney Mystery #24) by Mississippi author Carolyn Haines. With Halloween just around the corner, Sarah Booth is happily enjoying her time with Coleman, while Tinkie is adjusting to new motherhood. But when an old family friend of Sarah Booth's shows up on her doorstep asking for help in finding her missing daughter, the Delaney Detective Agency is on the case and headed for New Orleans. When she learns a local cult may be involved—one whose leader will stop at nothing to recruit new members, Sarah Booth wonders if she's in over her head this time...! I loved it! (Fiction—Print)

Tamara: World of Wonders: In Praise of Fireflies, Whale Sharks, and Other Astonishments by Aimee Nezhukumatathil. A lovely story that is beautifully told. I love the way the author talks about animals (and some plants) that she has encountered in her life and weaves these experiences into her personal life. Her use of imagery and metaphor is so imaginative and delightful, as are her drawings—I especially like the frillygilled axolot!! Love, love, love this book!! (Non-Fiction—Print)

# Some Bolivar County History...

#### "Rosedale by Florence Sillers Ogden"

# The last excerpt left off at the end of the paragraph beginning: "Some of those who composed the settlement of Floreyville were:"

"Business houses and residences soon sprang up around the plantation-home courthouse. The first residence was built by B. K. Bruce, the Negro sheriff, on the site of the present Gulf Oil filling station. Judge B. F. Trible built a home which still stands, across from the railroad station. Mr. Will Jones built on the site of the W. B. Roberts home. Dr. Alex Reeves built an office and bedroom opposite the present Methodist Church. Colonel Alex Yerger built a two-story frame hotel, which he operated, located on the northeast corner of Court and Front streets. In1874 Colonel Frank Montgomery built a home on the block north of the present Methodist Church. The house burned in 1943. His daughter, Miss Lottie Montgomery, was living there at the time.

In 1876, by an act of the legislature, during the term of service of Representatives Colonel Green Clay and R. J. I. J. Shelby, and Senator James R. Chalmers, the name of the county seat was changed from Floreyville to Rosedale. The residence courthouse burned and was rebuilt by the insurance companies, about 1877. Rosedale was incorporated by an act of the legislature, February 23, 1882. A meeting for organization was called by George P. Melchoir, the sheriff, and W. A. Shelby, deputy sheriff, at the sheriff's office. The following were elected and constituted the first mayor and board of aldermen: O. G. McGuire, mayor; N. B. Bloodworth, R. H. Purnell, aldermen; W. C. P. Jones, city marshal; John L. Gill, treasurer; B. C. Johnson, secretary and surveyor. E. H. Moore, attorney, was selected to draft the first ordinance for the future government of Rosedale. The first town health officer was Dr. J. W. Dulaney. He was also the first county health officer. Ben C. Johnson agreed to do all the engineering and surveying for the town, in addition to his duties as secretary. His salary was fixed at one hundred dollars a month."
